Tackling the gender binary in reproductive Health Care

Are you noticing big gaps in what you need from a sexual or reproductive health service?

Does the thought of rocking up to a 'women's clinic' get you worried as all hell?

Does it get your goat every time cervical screening, endometriosis or pregnancy is talked about as "only an issue for women"?

We don't need to tell you that when it comes to reproductive and sexual health services that the gender binary still reigns supreme.

Working It Out and Women's Health Tasmania reckon something can be done about this.

Women's Health Tasmania makes podcasts. And we think it's about time we made a podcast that shone a bright light on sexual and reproductive health for people who aren't cis.

But we literally cannot do it without you.

We need a brains trust: people with lived experience as trans and gender diverse folk to help steer this podcast so that it's talking about the right things.

All trans and gender diverse people are welcome to express interest in being on the advisory group.

We also reeeeeeally need to hear from trans guys, trans masc folk and non-binary people who were presumed female at birth – in other words, folk who might be having to interact with health care services that are often aimed at cisgender women.

- Attending 3 advisory group meetings at WIO
- Being part of a group conversation that will identify the big issues in reproductive and sexual health care for trans and gender diverse people
- Giving feedback on direction of the podcasts
- Help us know where to look for people who might want to be interviewed for the podcast
- You'll be paid a sitting fee of \$40 per hour for the meetings
